Rector's Reflections

Advent is a season of watching and waiting. But, most of us do not like to wait. I certainly don't like waiting at all. I am impatient and much too busy. Furthermore, in our current era of technology, we expect immediate responses and instant gratification. This makes Advent the most counter-cultural season of our liturgical year. Watching and waiting in joyful hope for the great adventus, or "coming," of our Lord Jesus is antithetical to the frantic buying, decorating, and preparing for the secular Christmas holiday. We are invited to slow down, watch, wait, and search time for hope.

We are hearing from the Gospel of Luke in our new liturgical year (Year C). More than any other Evangelist, St. Luke insists that we search time itself for hope. The good news he seeks to share is not an ageless truth, not a new insight into the human condition. No, it is an event, one that changes everything. One that can, and must, be located at a particular moment in time.



The Gospel we hear this Sunday (Luke 3: 1-6) carefully situates this event into time.

In the fifteenth year of the reign of Tiberius Caesar, when Pontius Pilate was governor of Judea, and Herod was tetrarch of Galilee . . . the word of God came to John the son of Zechariah in the desert (3:1-2).

Jesus is the "event" we have been longing for and he is the source of our hope. St. Luke understands the life, death, and resurrection of Jesus to be the advent of a new and final exodus. This one, comes out of time itself. Unlike his Jewish contemporaries, John comes preaching a baptism that is not to be repeated, because now the time has come for true repentance, a final turning away from sin. Just as the prophets had promised, God is opening a new way, out of exile, back into fullness of life.

Prepare the way of the Lord, make straight his paths (Lk 3:4).

As we live through and emerge from pandemic, social unrest, racial, economic, and political injustice, we recognize that God offers us hope and a new way to live. Jesus is our "way and our truth and our life!" (John 14:6). We are waiting and longing for Jesus, but we are also searching for a new and better way to live, together.

Jesus came to us in time but the purpose and meaning of our lives are not products of time. They arise from time's origin and destiny. St. Luke wants us to understand that long ago, a way forward, a way out of time itself, appeared in time. In Jesus, Divinity has joined itself to Humanity by a bond that can never be broken. Every human experience has been touched by God **from the inside.** Jesus, born in time is the Word made flesh. He enters time. He is our way forward, beyond time itself. I can wait for that!

We are living in a broken world that needs the brilliance of God's love. How will each of us be spreading this illumination during Advent and Christmas?



Just a quick note from me with an update or two! First, I want to let you know that something exciting (for me, anyway! HA!) has arrived at St. Andrew's in the last month... a COMPOST DUMPSTER! I don't know how or why, but weekly it seems, our caring custodial team finds YARD WASTE in the GARBAGE DUMPSTER, which is not only not good for the environment, but it can also get us <u>fined</u>. All 3 dumpsters are very well labeled on the front, please be sure when you are taking out your trash, recycling, and compost after a meeting, Sunday once per month Coffee Hour, or any other gathering that creates waste, that you put all things in the right dumpsters! I am SO excited that we have the correct resources now to make this very easy for everyone to do as you pitch in to take care of our buildings and grounds each week! If you help out in this way and don't know where the keys are to the dumpster locks (we have to lock them because unfortunately we get a lot of illegal dumping on our property and in our

St. Andrew's Community Asks:



Please resist the urge to give holiday-specific foods this season, and instead, follow this list of suggested donations that REALLY help our neighbors:

Holiday food is NOT needed! (You MAY donate monetarily directly to FamilyWorks in order to support their yearly ordering and delivering of pies, but that's it!) The food bank purchases turkey breasts to give as one of the protein options, and they always have produce. What you and I think of as holiday food is great, but we need to be focused on food that provides many meals--not just one. ("I cannot tell you how many cases of pumpkin filling and cranberry sauce we have and struggle to give out." --Jennifer Rogers)

Focus on these food items for donation:

Condiments: (most food is bland and condiments are costly)

Spices

Hot sauces

Salsa

pickles

Crackers

COFFEE – 1 lb bags, ground

Black and Green tea

Soups – not condensed

Shelf stable non-dairy milk

Cooking oil (smaller bottles – not huge 1 gallon ones)

Canned fruit

"DID YOU KNOW?" Facts about the unhoused:

1) Martin v.Boise (Idaho)

The ruling in 2018 held that cities cannot enforce anti-camping ordinances if they do not have enough homeless shelter beds available for their homeless population. The decision was based on the Eighth Amendment to the U.S. Constitution's prohibition on cruel and unusual punishment.

In 2019, the U.S. Supreme Court declined to hear an appeal of the case, leaving the precedent intact in the nine Western states under the jurisdiction of the Ninth Circuit (Alaska, Arizona, California, Hawaii, Idaho, Montana, Nevada, Oregon, and Washington).

- 2) In 2020, there were 11,751 individuals in King county considered homeless based on the Point in Time count. Homeless advocates state this number is an underestimate.

- Minimum enrollment of 15 people. Class size will be capped at 30.
- Seating will be at 8' rounds (per usual) but with only three people per table. Every effort will be made to maximize ventilation.
- For safety's sake, masks and physical distancing will be required at all times during the workshop. Vaccination or a negative COVID test within 72 hours of the class will be required for participation.
- No food will be offered by St. Andrew's, including the popular Saturday lunch. Please bring a bagged lunch that day. Potluck snacks will be allowed if you feel comfortable sharing.

Now to the fun stuff! Peter will be leading us in the creation of an Icon to St. Brigid, one of three patron saints to Ireland (the other two being St. Patrick and St. Columba). Brigid was the founder of a number of nunneries and monasteries, the most famous being in Kildare, Ireland where it served as a double abbey for both monks and nuns. It is rumored that when St. Patrick heard her final vows, he used the form typically reserved for the ordination of priests, to which he replied "so be it, she is destined for great things." (1, 2) St. Brigid's feast day is celebrated on February 1, making it especially appropriate that we write an icon to her at this time of year.

The fee for the Winter workshop will be \$300.00, which includes all materials required to write your own icon to St. Brigid. While we do not anticipate any issues with gathering, we are still mindful of COVID and its unpredictability. If for some reason we are forced to cancel due to public health concerns, rest assured that all class fees will be promptly refunded.






From there, AdventWord shares and reposts on each site – amplifying the prayers during this holy season. Find the social feed on <u>our website</u>, or on your favorite social media platform.
