THE LITURGY OF THE WORD

FIRST LESSON

2 Corinthians 4:16--5:9 (read by Keith Dunn)

We never give up. Our bodies are gradually dying, but we ourselves are being made stronger each day. These little troubles are getting us ready for an eternal glory that will make all our troubles seem like nothing. Things that are seen don't last forever, but things that are not seen are eternal. That's why we keep our minds on the things that cannot be seen. Our bodies are like tents that we live in here on earth. But when these tents are destroyed, we know that God will give each of us a place to live. These homes will not be buildings that someone has made, but they are in heaven and will last forever. While we are here on earth, we sigh because we want to live in that heavenly home. We want to put it on like clothes and not be naked. These tents we now live in are like a heavy burden, and we groan. But we don't do this just because we want to leave these bodies that will die. It is because we want to change them for bodies that will never die. God is the one who makes all of this possible. He has given us his Spirit to make us certain that he will do it.

So always be cheerful! As long as we are in these bodies, we are away from the Lord. But we live by faith, not by what we see. We should be cheerful, because we would rather leave these bodies and be at home with the Lord. But whether we are at home with the Lord or away from him, we still try our best to please him.

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CONSTANCE LAUGHTON CAMPBELL (CONNIE) MAY 30. 1933 - JUNE 21. 2022

CONNIE CAMPBELL WAS BORN ON MEMORIAL DAY IN 1933 AND ALWAYS LOVED THAT THERE WAS A PARADE ON HER BIRTHDAY. SHE LEFT US ON SUMMER SOLSTICE 2022 AFTER A REMARKABLE 89 YEARS ON EARTH AND A YEAR AND A HALF AFTER COVID TOOK THE LIFE OF HER BELOVED BROTHER JIM LAUGHTON.

CONNIE WAS BORN IN HANOVER NEW HAMPSHIRE TO JIM AND MARY LAUGHTON AND TRAVELED AROUND THE COUNTRY AS A CHILD FOLLOWING HER FATHER AND HIS NAVAL CAREER. AFTER THE CHILDHOOD DEATH OF HER FIRST SON, JIMMY, SHE RELOCATED TO SEATTLE FROM CALIFORNIA AND, AS A SINGLE MOM, BEGAN TO RAISE HER TWO CHILDREN AND BEGIN HER LIFE IN THE NORTHWEST.

AS A VIVACIOUS 27-YEAR-OLD, SHE HAD HER CHOICE OF SUITORS AND CHOSE AL CAMPBELL IN 1964. TOGETHER THEY SHARED 54 YEARS OF MARRIAGE IN THE UP-AND-COMING NEIGHBORHOOD OF WALLINGFORD. CONNIE LOVED TRAVELING AND PARTICULARLY LOVED HER TRIPS TO HAWAII. FOLLOWING AL'S DEATH IN 2019, SHE AND HER DAUGHTER, MARY MOVED TOGETHER TO EDMONDS. MARY WAS HER HOUSEMATE, TRAVELING COMPANION, AND BEST FRIEND. TOGETHER THEY CRUISED, RV'D, AND CAMPED THROUGHOUT THE COUNTRY. CONNIE WAS A PROLIFIC SHORT STORY WRITER AND WAS PUBLISHED FROM TIME TO TIME.

LEFT BEHIND TO CELEBRATE HER LIFE ARE HER SON, REDGE CAMPBELL AND HIS WIFE SARA, AND HER DAUGHTER, MARY DUNN. THEY, ALONG WITH 6 GRANDCHILDREN, JAMES, KELSEY, KEITH, MCKAY, ANDREW, AND LILY, AND 4 GREAT-GRANDCHILDREN WILL MISS HER DEARLY.
