Message from the Interim Rector



"To all God's beloved at Saint Andrew's who are called to be saints: Grace and peace from God our Father and the Lord Jesus Christ. First, I thank my God through Jesus Christ for all of you..." – adaption of Romans 1:7-8a

As our time of journeying together during this liminal time comes to an end, I want to once again call you into a place of grace and peace. I realize how much has been done through our ministries and in our community life together. And, indeed, all that has happened through and by YOU, with God's help. It's happened as people said "yes!", as folks trained for new ministry opportunities, and as you learned how to do things – sometimes in new ways. And whatever else, we cannot forget that we are God's beloved, as are our neighbors near and far.

This past year, we've had energetic, joyous times: the Epiphany celebration (replicated early in 2025 on Epiphany Eve), seven baptisms, work days, and even some fundraising parties, not to mention a pony party. We've had quiet, meditative times: Lenten

Evening Prayer services, first Sunday Contemplative Services in the Spirit of Taizé, and special services during the year including Good Friday and the Longest Night.

And St. Andrew's has reached out to those in need: cooking food for Teen Feed and for one of the tent cities, providing money to a number of organizations including those who house the unhoused or are building new housing (St. Luke's, Ballard, our sister church), direct food aid and grocery cards for food and gas, and so much more!

Our liturgical life has been further broadened. Our Lay Preachers in training, Rich Ater and Susan Wilbanks, worked alongside their feedback groups, doing sermons in several different seasons. They are both now licensed which brings more voices to the proclamation of the gospel here in the congregation. Eucharistic Visitor training happened in February and we returned to a monthly lay ministry of laying on of hands and prayers during all three Sunday services.

Although it took me longer than I anticipated, I finally finished calling all families listed in the parish directory. I enjoyed engaging with folks in these conversations and in follow-up one on one conversations, especially as you shared about your lives, spiritual and otherwise.

And THANKS! As always, I need to thank folks who did much to support the church, especially those who worked behind the scenes. Your Senior Warden, Andrew Benson, spent hours working on not only the "regular" things of being Senior Warden, but navigating both the end of the parish profile development as well as the call portions of the search, significant interactions with The Children's School, and even did the handson work of transitioning St. Andrew's website when the Diocesan website liaison's position was cut. The Technology Team did work on cameras, new computers (so needed for staff as we were spending inordinate amounts of time just waiting for and wondering whether our computers would boot up). John Ginn took on a bunch of projects with some long-deferred building needs like the missing stair railing (called out in our insurance inspection), oversaw a big lighting project (thanks, Greg Kromholtz, for all your work on this specific project), and – as always – 101 "little" things like floor issues, door issues. I'm pretty sure that by the end of the year, John wanted to immediately delete any email I sent to him that started, "No rush, but…" Cheri Peele has almost single-handedly managed, arranged, and herded folks into participating in hospitality roles. Please thank her the next time you see her, in that she was the reason that you can go to coffee hour and that after many events, we have clean dishes again as she has manned the dishwasher. Ongoing support for liturgy and worship is ably provided by the women (and occasional men) of the altar guild, flower guild, and banner moving committee (who are great with tall ladders!) as well as the mostly vestry team who set up/clean up for the Contemplative Service in the Spirit of Taizé.

All this said, I'd be remiss if I didn't thank our wonderful staff who have worked diligently and with at times amazing creativity through this year: Leslie, without whom we'd have no bulletins and wouldn't have the lines of communication we all find helpful; Megan, who shepherds our children and youth, even to literally the borders, at times during times when she is personally challenged, and Tim, who is an angel in disguise, both challenging us through words of texts and in his prowess not only as organist and pianist, but in his interactions with a variety of other musicians he has invited into our midst. Gretchen, who came on board mid-year as the Outreach Missioner, has already introduced the congregation to a number of partner organizations and has increased participation in hands-on outreach, particularly in feeding ministries. Kevin, our contract bookkeeper, while not technically a member of staff, continues to keep the financial accounts up to date, bills and payroll paid, and more.

And for those I've missed thanking by name or ministry area, please know that your contributions to the church are appreciated and continue to support ministry each and every day.

I look forward to hearing where you will go in this next year and how you and your incoming rector will work together to continue the ministry of St. Andrew's.

Message from the Children, Youth and Adult Formation Director

Dear Saint Andrew's Community,

2024 was a big year for our children and youth ministry programs! We had a year full of growth and renewal as we continue to work through this transitional season. There are many new faces that we have welcomed into our community, and have enriched our worship! Our faith formation programs have continued to grow this year also.

Nursery and Children's Church

This year began with in-person Sunday morning church school at 10am for our preschool through 5th grade students. We welcomed an average of 8 kids per week every Sunday in our Church School and have only grown from there. We had a total of 30 kids who regularly attended our Sunday church school in 2024. Our church school utilizes Illustrated Ministries Children's Curriculum which follows the Revised Common Lectionary. The curriculum celebrates the love of God through inclusive and progressive Christ-centered theology. Our nursery remained open upon signup in 2024 under the experienced direction of Annalisa Conserti-Jones. We also integrated our children into the Easter Vigil this last year with much success! This summer we welcomed back Vacation Bible School at Saint Andrew's for the first time since 2019 and it was a joy! Finally, we ended the year with a fun Christmas pageant at the 4pm service on Christmas Eve! A special thank you to Annalisa Conserti-Jones, Colin Cassady, Margaret Cassady, Kester Limner, and Elizabeth Darlington for their help and leadership with our Children's Ministries in 2024! I also want to thank all of the wonderful volunteers who helped make our Summer VBS happen!

Middle School Youth Group

Our 6th through 8th grade students met every other Sunday evening at 6:30 to 8pm for games and community. This group was led by Megan McInnis and John Pitts throughout the year and averaged 5 students. Highlights of the year included our annual outing to Bob's Pumpkin Patch on the Sunday before

Halloween and our Christmas Party with its gingerbread village decorating competition (which our middle schoolers won), plus a white elephant gift exchange. We also introduced a new Youth Curriculum this fall called "Holy Troublemakers and Unconventional Saints" (book by Daneen Akers, curriculum written by Wendy Barrie) Thank you to John Pitts for his volunteer work with our Middle School Youth Group!

High School Youth Group

Our 9th through 12th grade students met every other Sunday evening at 6:30pm for community and fun activities! Our bi-weekly youth group started at the beginning of the year with an optional bible study class from 6PM through 6:30PM followed by a check-in and fun activities from 6:30 through 8pm. We began to integrate the curriculum based on Daneen Akers' book, "Holy Troublemakers and Unconventional Saints" in



the fall of 2024. Our high school youth group generally had a total of 10 students participate throughout the year. This group was led by Megan McInnis and Lily Nichols. Some highlights of the High School Youth Group were our annual trip to Bob's Pumpkin Patch on the Sunday before Halloween. Our High School Youth were also a part of our Annual Christmas Party.

For our summer trip we went to Tucson, Arizona to learn about our immigration process, and migrant stories through the organization called "Border Links". This trip was impactful, and the students who participated were thoughtful and considerate

as they navigated this complex issue. I want to send a huge thank you for all those who donated to make this trip happen, and for John Pitts who co-led the trip with Megan. Thank you to Lily Nichols and John Pitts for their leadership with our High School Youth!



Message from the Music Director

In 2024 St. Andrew's Church has continued to try to define what it means to be a worshiping community post-Covid, post-George Floyd, during increasing climate and political upheaval. It's clear that the white male Euro-centered Anglican tradition only speaks part of what we need to say to God. What is the message of hope that Jesus brings us, and how do we bring it to people in North Seattle?

The congregation as a whole continues to expand their experience of the highest quality non-Anglican worship. Throughout the season of Epiphany 2025, we will use a liturgy from the New Zealand Prayerbook,



that was specifically written to include indigenous voices and ideas as well as traditional ones. Our white

Hymnal Supplement brings us many sacred songs from non-Anglican traditions, particularly the rich black American culture, and songs that didn't even exist when the old blue hymnal was assembled. Many we have learned and use on a regular basis, many are waiting to be revealed.

Can you commit one night a week to bringing that message of hope to the St. Andrew's community? People who love to sing are always welcome in the choir. Rehearsal is 7:30 every Thursday during the school year, and we sing at the Sunday 10am service. Please contact director Tim Drewes for more information.

This past year we heard handbell ringers in worship on a few occasions. If we can find six people in the church to commit to every-week rehearsals, we can do that regularly – you can make it happen!

Thanks are due to so many people who have a leadership role in worship – the altar guild, bread bakers, ushers, readers, eucharistic assistants, live-stream operators, and more. I'm particularly thankful to Pastor Rachel and Leslie for the planning and working out the "nuts and bolts" of worship.

Your choir spends lots of time in order to bring a special way of praying to worship at St. Andrew's. Thank you for your commitment, singers!

Soon we will welcome our new rector with a special Celebration of new ministry. We're looking forward to the new ideas, new energy and vision he or she will bring to our worship.

Contemplative Worship

The Contemplative Service happens at 5pm on the first Sunday of each month. I feel like we are hitting our stride after the disruption of Covid. Attendance is usually 35-40. About a dozen volunteers, including some



youth members, either sing or play an instrument on an occasional basis. They are supported by a small group of professional song leaders who are now familiar with the service and even becoming friends with some of the regular attendees. Good things are happening!

Much of the work that goes into this service is made possible by a generous gift from Jay Gillette and family.

The Contemplative Service is a special ministry of St. Andrew's – there only a few other regularly scheduled worship services in the Puget Sound region that use music

from the Taizé community. It's a style of worship that seems to speak especially well to people who have little or no experience in a faith community. Do you have friends who yearn for a relationship with God, but are afraid or have been wounded by organized religion? (Seattle is full of them!) Invite them - I think there is potential for doubling or tripling the number of people who this service touches, if we had a way of letting them know about it.

Adult Faith Formation

2024 was marked by some fabulous opportunities for formation.

Lent included our Wednesday evenings with both an in-person class (Episcopal 101) and on-line class (Bearing Witness: A Journey with Holy Land Christians) as well as the Monday book study, where the group read and discussed: Sara Miles' *Take this Bread*, Frederick Buechner's *Wishful Thinking*, poetry of George Herbert, and Anne Lamott's *Travelling Mercies*.

Our "Summer Sundays" not only included outdoors events, fellowship gatherings, and more, but we welcomed Susan Pitchford who presented on "Poverty of Spirit in the Franciscan Tradition", Diane Santiago who introduced ways of thinking about "Pronouns and Gender Identity", and The Rev. Kendall Haynes, as he shared on "Religious Trauma: Harm and Healing in the Name of God".

In the fall, we welcomed back The Rev. Dr. Frank Spina who presented three sessions, entitled *A Tale of Three Brothers* where he invited us to delve into:

- "Cain and the Cursed Ground" (Genesis 4)
- "Esau and the Face of God" (Genesis 33)
- "Joseph and a Lurking Providence (Genesis 37—50)

In 2024, Susan Chloupek continued to lead the Education for Ministry program (details below). In addition, Susan graciously led a Thursday evening in-person Bible study on the Gospel of Mark In 2025, plans are to continue with a romp through Romans.

Education for Ministry

EfM is a four-year course offered by the University of the South located in Sewanee, TN, and held locally or online. St. Andrew's class meets weekly on Monday nights during the school year. Three classes each month occur online from 6:30 – 8:30pm, and the one in-person class happens from 6-8pm to accommodate our ferry commuters. Our time is spent in prayer, study, theological reflection, and being present to each other as we share our spiritual journeys. Commitment to participate is made one year at a time. Creation Keepers

The Creation Keepers (CK) group is reactivating following a quiet period during the Covid years. In 2024 we revived the Green Corner column in the church newsletter, with intermittent articles now, and the desire for more regular offerings as we gather steam. Van Bobbit also led two nature walks for church members. Finally, we made plans to offer the Episcopal Church's new educational program, *Love God, Love God's World*, sometime in 2025 (schedule to be worked out with the new rector; stay tuned!).

Much of our time went into brainstorming what we could do in the future. CK's prior focus was to work with other groups at St. Andrew's to "green" our campus, and this remains important. However, the successful completion of some big projects (such as solar panels and "rain wise" cisterns and garden installations) allows us to imagine new projects to and re-focus our purpose. How can we best help St. Andrew's be a Creation-oriented congregation, especially at this moment in our parish life? We are hoping for new CK members from all generations to help us answer that question. (Jr. High and High School people, we need your input too!). Sacred Grounds Committee

The Sacred Grounds Committee is tasked with keeping Saint Andrew's grounds safe, attractive, and inviting. To that end, we engaged in the following actions during 2024: We have:

- Purchased two large blue ceramic planters and placed them at the church entrance, filling them with beautiful and hardy foliage that will remain healthy throughout the year.
- Converted the fallow garden plots on the SW edge of the grounds into productive gardens, overseen by members of the greater Seattle community. This outreach extends to unhoused gardeners who are tending these plots to provide their shelters with fresh produce.

It was in the development of this garden ministry that the recent costly water leak was discovered. The conversion of the fallow plots into usable gardens required fixing the irrigation lines and creating a viable and non-intrusive hose access for the gardeners in the pre-school area. These tasks were realized by Sacred Grounds members along with the help of Saint Andrew congregants not involved with Sacred Grounds.

 Held three successful 'Holy Jeans' work parties in which Saint Andrews congregants spread mulch, weeded, and planted ivy around the labyrinth and bulbs along the entrance walkways (which will bloom this spring 2025).



- 4) Removed Himalayan blackberry vines and other out of control flora from the back yard of the rental property directly south of Saint Andrew's on 1st Ave. (Andrew Benson, Head of the Vestry, worked extensively on this as well.) This beautification project played a major role in making the rental property presentable and rentable.
- 5) Engaged Margaret Cassady to prune the rose bushes along the east side walkway to the church side door.
- 6) Maintained the cistern systems both by the north entrance and by the southwest garden shed. This is an ongoing task.
- 7) Kept an eye on safety issues concerning walkways and stairways, to determine when power washing is necessary. We also brought additional safety needs to the attention of the Vestry.

Through these actions we feel that we are fulfilling our mission in creating a lovely, inviting, and safe church environment, and look forward to continuing to do so in 2025. In the words of one of our greater Seattle community gardeners, "This place is magical!"

The Labyrinth Ministry

Our labyrinth, Fàilte, Gaelic for Welcome, is open to all people who wish to use it. If you've never walked a labyrinth and would like a one-on-one orientation, please email me and we can set up a time. It is heartening that office staff and visitors have reported seeing the labyrinth used by people from the neighborhood.

Even though we could not participate in Labyrinth events at church using our lovely Fàilte labyrinth, we did have an active labyrinth group all year. Over the course of 2024 I have held 39 Virtual Labyrinth Walks, participants using their finger labyrinths, paper or hard. This labyrinth walks occurred weekly on Thursday through the entire year. With a total of 133 people participating in these offerings, our weekly events have a core group of 4 - 6 participants. Our weekly virtual walks will continue through 2025. I'm hoping I will be able to facilitate some live events on Fàilte, as infection rates and hospitalizations decline to a pre-pandemic level. It has been rewarding providing these walks to our parishioners.

Buildings & Maintenance

Governance

Vestry

The Vestry is the elected governing body of St. Andrew's Episcopal Church. Regularly, four members are elected each year at our parish annual meeting. This year we will be electing four 3-year term members and one 1-year unexpired term. The Vestry has three primary canonical responsibilities:

- 1. Take care of the parish finances
- 2. Take care of parish buildings
- 3. Recommend people from the parish for ordination in the Episcopal Church

However, the Interim Rector consults with the Vestry on many other aspects related to our common life at St. Andrew's.

A member of the Vestry should be open and willing to share their faith journey with others and to witness to the Good News of Jesus Christ in their life. Vestry members should be worshipping and financially supportive members, at least 16 years old, compliant with parish by-laws, and willing to fulfill a full three-year term. Vestry members also are required to assist in the link between the parish and the diocese.

Parish Support

Stewardship Committee

Will Lewis and Mark Gargett led the Stewardship campaign during the fall months of 2024 for fiscal year 2025. To get quickly to the numbers, pledges totaled roughly \$388,000, with approximately 97 pledges. Both of the totals were down from last year.

Our membership has experienced a slight decline, for reasons that are natural and understandable. The amount of individual pledges is actually up. The Vestry and the Finance Committee are aware of this. There is concern, but not alarm. We expect to fill the gap in 2025 with prudent spending and supplemental fundraising. The challenge for the church and its new rector is to grow the congregation and the number of pledgers.

FEEDING THE HUNGRY

Teen Feed - St. Andrew's provides a meal on the third Wednesday of every month as part of the Teen Feed program in the University District. This program provides meals to homeless and at-risk youth without stable family support. We cook 65 meals every third Wednesday, and volunteers are needed for chopping, cooking, delivery, and/or serving from 2:00 - 7:00pm (depending on the task). Our regular volunteers are Cris Blair, Margaret Mori, Mary Katka, Linda Prot, Betsy Steele, Margo Rogers, and the women of Delta Kappa Gamma – Beta Sigma Chapter (an international professional organization for women educators). Camp United We Stand tent city – when we make the food for Teen Feed, we make extra and deliver it to Camp United We Stand tent city. We cook for about 35 people at the camp. They are currently located at Shoreline Free Methodist Church.

Ravenna Pop Up Kitchen (RPUK) – is a grassroots community group that serves our neighbors with a meal every Sunday under I-5 on 65th Street. St. Andrews provides sandwiches 3rd Sunday of every Month after the 10am service coffee hour (generally around 11:30am-12:00pm). Come make and package sandwiches.

Food Bank – FamilyWorks – Every week, the donation basket is available in the narthex for your donations. FamilyWorks Food Bank is our local food bank located in the Wallingford and Greenwood neighborhoods. Karen Chartier brings the donations to Family Works.

We will also be having three special food drives.

- Saturday, February 1st (St. Abigail's saint day) from 10:00am until 1:00pm in the St. Andrews parking lot. St. Abigail, is the patron saint of bees and beekeeping. So, in her honor, we will be collecting donations of honey, tea, coffee ground or instant, and jams (and any other food on the FamilyWorks food bank list).
- Saturday, May 17th (St Honoré's saint day) from 10:00am until 1:00pm in the St. Andrews parking lot. St. Honore is the patron saint of bakers. He is also the patron saint of confectioners, pastry chefs, and flour sellers. In his honor, we will be collecting donations of flour, sugar, salt, cinnamon, vegetable oil and dried fruit (and any other food on the FamilyWorks food bank list).
- The third special food drive for FamilyWorks will be in the fall of 2025 (exact date to be announced).

Manna Bags – Cris Blair continues to maintain St. Andrew's supply of manna bags which are regularly given away to unhoused visitors at the church and distributed by parish members to the wider community. WELCOMING THE STRANGER

Advent Giving Tree – We collected over 60 gifts for the children of refugees in partnership with the Diocese of Olympia Refugee Resettlement Office (RRO).

Welcome kits – Refugees arrive to the United States with very little and have to quickly begin their lives over again. Welcome Kits are a significant part of welcoming and honoring them when they first arrive in the Seattle area. We will be working in 2025 with the RRO to collect items such as cleaning supplies, kitchen items and baby needs.

Ditty Bags – In the fall, we will collect basic toiletries and handknit caps in partnership with the Seattle Seafarers Center whose mission is to welcome and care for seafarers who visit Puget Sound.



St. Andrew's Episcopal Church Minutes of Annual Meeting Sunday, February 4, 2024

The meeting was called to order at noon, and an opening prayer was led by the Rev. Rachel Endicott.

The Annual Meeting minutes from the February 2023 gathering were approved.

The Rev. Rachel Endicott provided an interim rector's address, in which she summarized 2023's accomplishments in ministry.

Gretchen Hayslip, Senior Warden, gave a presentation in which she thanked a number of people.

Pastor Rachel provided special recognition to Amanda Mitchell, for her behind the scenes work on streaming and as a go to person on the IT team.

Pastor Rachel announced that the Senior Warden for 2024 will be Andrew Benson. The Junior Warden will be chosen by the vestry at their next vestry meeting.

Treasurer Ken Feldman gave the financial reports, noting that the approved budget for 2024 incorporates almost all of "dream budget" thanks to pledges of over 400,000. He thanked Mike Hicks as stewardship chair. In 2023 (year just ended) operating budget, Ken Feldman spoke about 2023 operating budget, pointing out that we came in -7,128.93 which was much better than -24,043 which had been anticipated and was made up by transfer in from the Taizé special account and prior year net income. As regards the Capital Campaign, which will be in its final year of gathering pledges in 2024, Ken noted significant payments made this year and hopes in 2024 to receive enough additional money to be cash flow neutral for the fourth property.

Paula Benson (Profile Committee) gave a brief report and encouraged people to fill out the CAT survey and announced about the report of the survey and listening session on March 17th.

The vestry slate for 3-year terms starting in 2024 (Dan Catchpole, Will Lewis, Lily Nichols, and Cheri Peele) was approved by acclamation. The Delegates and Alternates for 2024 Diocesan Convention were also approved:

Cris Blair – 2-year term Levana Fletcher – 2-year term Kelli Jayn Nichols – 1-year term Jessica Thompson – 1-year term

Alternates were Cheri Peele and Caleb Hege.

Pastor Rachel thanked exiting vestry members – Cris Blair, Gretchen Hayslip, Mike Hicks, and Bill Yunker – providing a bag of goodies for their relaxing post-service to the vestry.

Vestry member Susan Wilbanks provided the closing prayer, and Pastor Rachel adjourned the meeting (time not noted).
